





Hamiota & Area Community Alliance

The Hamiota & Area Community Alliance is focused on careful planning and strong partnership.

he Alliance has partnered with a Government Relations firm called Counsel Public Affairs. They have outlined two different phases and committed to one phase at this present time. Phase one details that the Counsel will draft a detailed government relations plan for the Alliance, as well as assist in introductory meetings with provincial government officials. The counsel is going to complete tasks that involve:

- Drafting letters and requesting meeting with the Minister of Health and key staff
- Prepare short briefing materials prior to those meetings
- Support the Alliance at those meetings
- Engage key third-party stakeholders
- Prepare a comprehensive review of health ministry's budget to look for opportunities for the Alliance to achieve greater health care accessibility
- Set up regular meetings with the Alliance to ensure effective communications
- Plan a phase 2 town hall and draft a strategy document to be executed

Phase two is still in progress, however, something exciting is in preparation for the fall. Phase two includes different tasks that will touch on areas including:

- Re-establishing contact with key officials and making detailed request for funding in the 2026 provincial budget. It will include executing a town hall bringing community members, elected officials and health care providers together
- Phase two will be where Counsel really helps the Alliance achieve their goals. Phase one involves establishing a partnership with the Alliance and work towards expanding and improving the rural health care in Westman
- Work with the Alliance to execute a town hall in the fall that includes the Health Minister, Shared Health leadership, community members, key stakeholders and health care providers from the area
- Prepare briefing notes for town hall and work with Alliance to promote event and prepare invitations

- Engage members of the local media to promote the event
- Support the alliance on the ground at the event
- Work with the alliance to prepare a budget submission for Budget 2026 (Late October/Early November)
- Set up regular meetings with the Alliance to ensure effective communication

The Hamiota District Health Centre Foundation were extremely generous in giving the Alliance the funding to support their partnership with the Government Relations Firm. This foundation was established for the purpose of administering funds that are donated to help achieve the betterment of patient care. The alliance is very appreciative of the funding they received to support their partnership with the Government Relations Firm to help further along their initiatives in helping the Hamiota hospital.

Darwin Johns met with the agriculture minister Kostyshyn in early May to discuss the healthcare advancements in Hamiota and the importance of rural health care in the Manitoba ecosystem. The Healthcare Committee had a meeting with Shared Health at the end of June in Hamiota. The Healthcare Committee also has a meeting slated with the Health Minister on July 2nd in Winnipeg. This is an incredible opportunity that the Alliance is thrilled to have! Key priorities will be shared for the future healthcare in Hamiota. The main priority is to achieve 24/7 emergency room coverage at the Hamiota District Health Centre. More information on these meetings will be shared after they have taken place. 

ay 4-10 has been designed Emergency Preparedness Week and this year's theme is Be Pre-pared, Know Your Risks. National disasters are occurring more and more frequently. A quick look at the news and it won't take long to see a story about an out-of-control. Wildfire, a torrential flood or a serve storm wreaking havoc in an area. We tend to read these articles and sympathize with the people who have been evacuated and who's home are at risk. At the same time, we often think that a disaster would never happen in our area and promptly move on to our next task for the day. The irony is, many people dealing with disaster thought the exact same thing.

When disaster strikes, you and your family often have only minutes to flee and make crucial decisions. Your mind goes into survival mode. Tour perception narrows and you execute the essential tasks needed to stay safe, but you don't have the time the opportunity to think of everything you need to take with you, track it all down, pack it and get to safety.

Phone lines, cellular towers, and internet cables can (and mostly likely will) fail, leaving us without the communication we have come to rely on so much. If members of your family are not home when the disaster hit, do they know where to meet you if those lines of communication are cut?

Disasters and evacuation are stressful, scary and very busy A little bit of preparation ahead of time will help you het through.

Your Plan

Have essentials in your home to shelter in place for at least 72 hours.

Have a bag filled with essentials ready to go at all times in case of evacuation. Having water, food, prescription medications and chargers for your devices packed and ready will save you so much time and effort when an evacuation

A family disaster plan is something people often don't think of, but it will be a life saver if it's ever needed.

List everyone in your family, their work or school addresses,

contact numbers, medical conditions, vehicles etc. Have designated meeting place if the family is separated during the disaster. Tailor the plan to meet the needs you and your family and update it as needed. Have a copy in all your family vehicles and in your essentials bag; that way it always there when you need it.

You know your community, you know the risks that you could face, be it heavily wooded are phone to fire, or living near a river that could flood. Take that into account when you are getting prepared and include it in your emergency plan.

Any preparation and planning that you can do now, is one less thing to worry about when you are dealing with a disaster. It will help make a horrible experience easier to endure and safer for everyone. So Please, be prepared and know your

Flin Flon, Denare Beach and Creighton residents frustrated with wolf fire response

This arial phot was taken of a Northern village, Denare Beach located near the Saskatchewan border. Residents were evacuated dure to the wild fires that threatened the Flin Flon communities. 4800 people were forced out of their homes and communities nearly over a month ago. Nearly 700 residents return to their community after the partially lifted evacuation. Most plans to rebuild and left with nothing. 200 homes destroyed by the fires, volunteer fire department wasn't equip to handle a fire to this magnitude.
