



BRANDON CRITICAL CARE CENTRE NEARS COMPLETION

FULL ARTICLE FROM PRAIRIE MOUNTAIN HEALTH

The new Critical Care Centre at Brandon Regional Health Centre (BRHC) is set to open this spring, marking a major expansion of health services for western Manitoba. The \$120-million redevelopment significantly increases critical care and inpatient capacity to better meet growing regional demand.

Once fully staffed, adult ICU capacity will increase from 10 to 16 beds, with 12 opening initially and four added later. A new 30-bed Internal Medicine Unit is also included, with 15 beds opening now and the remaining 15 to follow. The upgraded ICU will feature all private rooms—many with ensuite bathrooms—improving patient comfort, privacy, and infection prevention.

As the only ICU between Winnipeg and Regina along the Trans-Canada Highway, BRHC plays a crucial role as Manitoba's second referral centre, serving patients across the province and neighbouring Saskatchewan. Provincial and Prairie Mountain Health officials say the expansion will reduce transfers to Winnipeg, improve patient flow, and allow more people to receive critical care closer to home.

The project was supported by the Province of Manitoba, Prairie Mountain Health, and significant community fundraising led by the BRHC Foundation's Foundation for Care campaign.

FERTILIZER SUPPLY RISKS RISING FOR 2026

Full Article from Farm Credit Canada

Conflict in the Middle East is tightening global nitrogen fertilizer supplies and driving prices higher, raising concerns for Canadian farmers ahead of the 2026 planting season. With key exporters disrupted and limited alternatives, eastern Canada—more reliant on imports—faces the greatest risk of shortages and higher costs, potentially squeezing farm margins if tensions persist.

Impact on Canadian Farmers

- **Rising input costs:** Higher nitrogen prices increase production costs, with fertilizer already making up 20–25% of total crop costs, squeezing margins for fertilizer-intensive crops.
- **Supply and timing risks:** Shipping disruptions could delay spring deliveries, forcing changes to application timing or fertilizer rates and potentially affecting yields.
- **Regional vulnerability:** Eastern Canadian farmers face greater risk due to reliance on imports and limited on-farm storage, while western producers have more short-term buffer.
- **Farm planning pressure:** Tighter margins and uncertainty increase the need for early coordination with input suppliers and financial lenders ahead of the 2026 season.

Overall, continued conflict and supply uncertainty increase both cost risk and operational risk for Canadian farmers, underscoring the importance of early planning, communication with retailers, and financial contingency strategies.

RURAL PARTNERSHIP FUELS STARS MISSION IN HAMIOTA

Last year the Shock Trauma Air Rescue Service (STARS) flew two missions to Hamiota. In addition, over the years, the community of Hamiota has supported the organization through a fuel cache to enable emergency equipment to be ready for its next patient.

STARS is a charitable not-for-profit organization that responds to emergency needs across the province. They draw their funding from government, individuals, service associations, businesses and charitable foundations. On March 24, three Hamiota community groups got together to present STARS with three \$2,500 donations.

STARS originally applied for a grant from the Hamiota Community Foundation, who invest the contributions they receive and use the income earned to make grants to a wide range of charitable groups. Realizing that the need for rural emergency medical service is of critical importance, the Foundation decided to pull in more support.

They joined forces with Acres for Hamiota and the Hamiota District Health Centre Foundation that serves Miniota, Hamiota, Oakview and Wallace-Woodworth. The \$7,500 grant to STARS was the result.

The grant application from STARS requested funding for a Hamilton T1 ventilator. This device is intended to provide critical respiratory support to severely ill or injured patients during transport. The ventilator is compact, portable, and highly versatile. It is designed for use in ambulances, helicopters, airplanes, and other medical transport situations. In their grant application STARS noted that their operational policy is to reach patients by any means required. While helicopters are often associated with STARS, the organization says that it also uses airplanes and ground ambulances depending on the situation.

STARS plans to give back to the community by providing Hamiota area residents with education and safety training delivered directly in the community. This includes landing zone training for fire departments, site workers and first responders, as well as critical care simulation training for rural health care providers.

In 2025-26, STARS flew 1,233 missions in Manitoba. Over 1,200 Manitobans could be impacted by this project.

“The steadfast love of the LORD never ceases; his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness.” Lamentations 3:22-23 (ESV)

EXCEPTIONAL MUSICIANS THRILL HAMIOTA AUDIENCE

It was family reunion time in Hamiota Hall as an exceptional musical duo unleashed their musical talent on Sunday afternoon.

Garnet Knight, a world class fiddler and son of Glen Knight had attended Hamiota school. A nephew of Hamiota's Wilma Bell he had many connections to Hamiota. His presence at a class reunion in the area last year sparked the idea to invite the duo for this concert.

Garnet is a third-generation musician from Chalet Beach near Matlock, Manitoba.

He began performing in old-time fiddle competitions as a child (a fiddle champion) and was working in country, bluegrass, and western swing bands by age 15.

Garnet moved to Calgary in 1988 and spent nearly a decade performing in the city's vibrant country music scene and in mountain ski-resort venues. Since returning to Manitoba in 1997, he continues performing with groups like The Spectacles, The Grant Simpson Jazz Swing Quartet, and of course, with Penny as part of their duo. He's a fiddle, guitar and mandolin teacher and a contest judge and mentor in the fiddle community.

A Winnipeg-born singer-songwriter, and multi-instrumentalist, Buhr has been performing since childhood—beginning as a church pianist at age 12 and later earning her RCM Grade 10 Piano certification.

As she became known as a vocalist she was challenged by someone to sing jazz. "I listened to Miles Davis, (many) original Jazz artists, Ella Fitzgerald..." she said, and soon made it her own. Hamiota heard several of her signature compositions including one about the man in the moon, which won her a prestigious career milestone – First Place at The Manitoba Voice Competition in Portage la Prairie.

When she performed it in Hamiota she said it was the focus she chose in light of her circumstances. Buhr sang her delightful piece, "No Time to Be Blue, Mr. Man in the Moon." You see, she faces deteriorating eyesight and is now legally blind. Her guide dog Mr. T. was a charming and well-behaved stage companion.

The New Horizons for Seniors Program (NHSP) federal grant supports projects designed by seniors and for seniors making the 'Penny and Garnet' show a free event that drew the community's older set. When everything has become very expensive, this was a great way to nurture the community.

It was a toe tapping event with fiddle favourites like Maple Sugar on the menu. The duo took requests and dancers took to the floor, jive style. This warm-hearted show included Wayfaring Stranger and ended with Garnet playing the beautiful, Ashokan Farewell.

PENNY INTRODUCES HER GUARDIAN ANGEL

Troubadour was a surprising guest at Hamiota Community Hall on Sunday. His harness gave away his purpose and Penny's cane completed the picture.

Troubadour is a Guide Dog for the Blind graduate who gives performing musician Penny Buhr a way to navigate this world since her visual impairment due to retinitis pigmentosa.

With deteriorating eyesight her life abruptly changed. "About nine years ago I got hit by a car. I flew over three lanes – 15 – 20 feet. My life did not flash before my eyes... all I wondered was 'how long I'm going to be in the air?' It was quite a miracle," she recounts. Her daughter, a nurse, told her she must have had angels cushioning her fall. She didn't break any bones except a cracked elbow.

Her daughter insisted that she needed a guide dog. They found, Guide Dogs for the Blind school – GDB.com, the longest running school and the one with an exceptional reputation for dogs who do not get distracted and fail their person.

"It was a 16-year-old girl that raised Troubadour. First, they get chosen from the litter because they show confidence and caution. From five weeks old they are watched to see what kind of inclinations they would have. They can't be sneaky ... lazy or aggressive," Penny explains.
